Sierra Leone: The Security-Development Nexus

The end of the Cold War has seen an acute increase globally in civil wars, making peacebuilding and post-conflict state reconstruction two of the most urgent priorities for the international community. In reality, peacebuilding, at the crossroads between security and development, is extremely challenging work. How peace can be achieved, while at the same time a state meets both security and development demands in the arena of reconstruction, are issues that our symposium explores.

The symposium focuses on Sierra Leone, a rare example of a nation that has been successful in its peace building efforts. Further, special attention will be paid to "security sector reform", that is, the rebuilding of capable and people-centered security forces (e.g. police, military), which are essential to establishing a solid base for security and development in war-torn nations.

On hand to discuss and to offer insight into these vexing issues are specialists from the United Kingdom, Japanese academia and the public sector.

This is the second symposium held by the Department of Global and Interdisciplinary Studies (GIS), Hosei University, Tokyo. GIS was established in 2008 with the purpose of providing an interdisciplinary education taught entirely in English.
