Seminar: Self and Culture I

授業コー A6424 In this seminar, we will explore issues related to the self and culture from the social psychological perspective. We will question the meaning of interdependence and the various goals and motives underlying interdependence. Why do East Asians value it? Why are they concerned about maintaining group harmony? What goals do these strategies serve for the self and for the group?

【Goal】

The goal of this course is to challenge stereotypical views associated with interdependence and independence and to gain a deeper understanding of the goals we pursue for the self in East Asian and North American cultures. Another important goal is to develop students' interest on the topic of self and culture and to help them formulate research questions based on the reading materials covered in class. This course will improve students' employability skills of critical thinking, written and oral communication, self-innovation, as well as collecting, analyzing, and disseminating information.

[Course Description]

Students will read, discuss, and apply research and theory on the self and culture, including topics such as independent vs. interdependent self-views, individualism vs. collectivism, self-enhancement vs. self-criticism motives, public vs. private self-consciousness, and compassionate vs. self-image goals. The primary method of learning will involve presentations and discussions. Each student will be required to do the readings and come to class prepared to discuss them. In addition, students will develop a research question of their interest to pursue in the following semester.
