#### **EDUCATION IN ENGLISH**

Students in the first year take English skills courses to enable them to read and write academic essays and construct opinions logically in English. All courses are taught in English throughout the 4 years of the degree program, which allows students to attain an advanced level of English proficiency.

#### **INTERDISCIPLINARY EDUCATION**

In years 1 and 2 students build a foundation in interdisciplinary education by completing a balanced number of courses from a diverse range of disciplines. In years 2 and 3 they focus on the fields they are interested in, complete comprehensive courses from a range of disciplines, and cultivate an interdisciplinary perspective that goes beyond the framework of existing fields. In years 3 and 4 they develop specialized knowledge in their chosen field of study through seminars and acquire the ability to apply basic knowledge to specific challenges.

#### **SMALL CLASSES**

All courses are organized into small classes so that students develop flexible and critical thinking through interactive learning, such as presentations and discussions.

From Hosei High school

1. To prepare for the TOEFL and get into GIS, I took a structured approach. First, I took a TOEFL practice test to get a feel for the format and style used on the exam. Once the results were out, I realized that I needed to work on my Reading and Writing sections. Hence, I started focusing more on reading and writing exercises, reading a lot of books written in English to improve my reading speed, summarizing a news article and writing opinions to improve my skills. I also got feedback on my essay from tutors since I joined online forums to discuss and share tips on TOEFL with fellow test-takers.

2. The difficulty that I faced during the study was a lack of motivation. Sometimes my score of TOEFL was lower than the previous one even though I worked hard. To overcome this, I started thinking about myself after I got into GIS and took classes that I want to take. However, still, there were times that I feel I didn't want to do anything, so I decided not to use my phone unless it was necessary.

**3.** It is essential to do your best without worrying about the outcome. Start with thinking about enjoying what you are doing!

#### **Designed school recommendations**

Keigo(Ist)

1. In order to acquire a school recommendation, I worked hard to get a good grade by reviewing and preparing for classes every day. Also, I tried several English exams, like TEAP, EIKEN, and TOEFL. I highly recommend you take any kind of English test as soon as you can to improve your scores and your English skills. For the English interview, I frequently practiced with native teachers at school.

2. It was hard for me to get good grades in mathematics and chemistry which I was really bad at. To overcome these problems, I often utilized YouTube videos explaining complicated theories in an easy way and asked lots of questions not only to my friends but teachers.

3. While preparing or studying for the entrance exam, you would feel really pressured. However, I recommend that you imagine what kind of university life you want to experience next year, and always motivate yourself to achieve your goals! And if you feel really frustrated in studying, do not push yourself too much and take plenty of rest :) I'm sure that you won't regret joining GIS, and I'm looking forward to seeing you on campus!!

#### **December Self Recommendation (A0) A standard**

1. I was admitted to GIS on the A standard of self-recommendation. The two main things I spent the most time on during the application period were the statement of purpose and interview. I spent most of my summer vacation working on the statement of purpose. I also read and studied current affairs in English because I knew through past questions that the A standard entrance examination for GIS had a choice question and a short answer question that asked for general knowledge. I prepared for the interview dozens of times with a native English teacher at my high school!

2. The most difficult part was writing the statement of purpose, improving IELTS scores, and getting a good grade point average. I took IELTS about 6 times during the exam period until I got a score that I was satisfied with. And as for the grade point average, it was not required in the GIS entrance exam, but I wanted to take the entrance exam with a score that I was satisfied with, so I worked very hard on it.

3. Unlike other departments, GIS is a liberal arts program, so students can learn based as their interests, regardless of the field. Choosing a university is very difficult, and the entrance exams are very tough. However, I am very happy to study at GIS, and I feel it every day from the bottom of my heart. Please come to OC and just listen to our talk show! I look forward to seeing you all on campus:)

1. I took the test using EIKEN Pre-1 for the preparation for the Common Test for University Admissions B type. In preparation for the EIKEN, I focused on vocabulary and writing. I studied 100 words in the beginning, and 200~300 words after I got used to them. I was conscious of linking words and meanings in a short time rather than reading example sentences carefully. In writing, I used topics from past exams. It's important to properly submit your writing to native speakers or school teachers to get feedback. I used past and predictive questions to prepare for the common entrance exam.

2. I think that the general entrance examination is a physical challenge because of the longer study period than other entrance examination methods. It was also difficult to maintain motivation. To overcome them, it is important not to lose sight of the goal.

3. It doesn't matter what the result is. If you keep working hard, you will always get close to your goals. I failed to get into the university I wanted to go to the most, but now I am thrilled at GIS. GIS gives everyone a chance to try. We are waiting for you!

#### General Entrance Examination (using English Score)

 I used my IELTS score for the entrance exam, and I put the most effort into writing. In the first part (explaining concisely about the diagram), I practiced describing the diagram with academic words without being confusing. In the second part (asking for your opinion), I found challenging to explain my point concisely because I wanted to say a lot of points which just made things confusing.

2. As I used my IELTS scores instead of taking the English exam, I chose maths for another subject. Most of the mathematic questions weren't too difficult so if you nail the basics (not textbook basic but entrance exam basic) and a bit of the applied questions you should be able to pass. I noticed that few people take maths as their other subject. If you are confident in maths, thenI would, advise you to take maths because it is simpler than the others (at least I think so!).

3. First, I am sure you're going to feel intimidated by the atmosphere but try not to stress out as it will only make you panic and you won't be able to show your full potential. Second, try and study every day because once you stop you won't feel like studying again, it is so hard to get back on track once you stop. Finally, if you feel down while studying try and think of the happy things that are waiting for you once you're done! What you could be doing this time next year!

#### Fall Self Recommendation (AO) A standard

1. Preparation for the TOEFL was simple but time-consuming. I took a few practice tests to go over my weaknesses which primarily were reading. I developed in this area by spending time on practice problems and exposing myself to English written texts. Once finished with a book, I briefly analyzed the text and compared it to other analyses which can be easily found on the internet.

2. Surprisingly, one of the biggest difficulties I faced during the exam was the speech section. This was because everyone else taking the test all started talking at the same time which can be very distracting. Probably is the most important thing is to try and block any excess noise so that you can move on at your own pace. One possible way of practicing this is to go to some very distracting or noisy place where you can study. Getting used to studying in such an environment might not be such a bad idea.

3. Make sure to prepare accordingly. Don't just work solely on your weak areas; continue to work on your strong areas, too. During the exam, mind your time management and stay calm! Richard(2nd)

# OAS PROGRAM

What is the OAS Program? OAS is an acronym for the Overseas Academic Study Program. This GIS-original program offers four partner schools in the US, the UK, Canada, and New Zealand to study in the regular faculties from sophomore to junior year for 4-10 months. It is not the same regular study abroad that many people think of, but rather, this is the study abroad program which enables you to cultivate your sense of cross-cultural understanding as a global citizen.

# The </u> Partner Schools



San Jose State University (the US) Located in the widely known Silicon Valley, you can learn about various fields ranging from early child education to environmental studies to graphics design.



Massey University (New Zealand) Half of the population in the city where the university is located is under the age of 25. Students can use the bus for free and can have a real experience of the local culture at school.



University of Sussex (the UK) Located an hour from London. Its exchange student program offers various courses and you can take classes with other students that are at higher academic levels.



#### University of Prince Edward Island (Canada)

It's located on the east side of Charlottetown in Canada and offers abundant academic support. It is also possible to take the English training program simultaneously.

#### Why did you decide to study abroad?

Since I had no experience being abroad, I was planning to study abroad before entering Hosei. I got used to studying "in English" and speaking up during classes as I spent time in GIS. It made me feel confident in catching up on classes while I study abroad. This became a huge step to actually make my decision. In fact, I spoke up as much as I could during my study abroad and I could share the original perspectives as an exchange student that local students could not think of.

#### What did you work hard during your study abroad?

Since I was an exchange student, I thought it would be difficult to make friends with people there. So I decided to actively join various communities. First, I got along with my flatmates in my dorm and they took me to beaches by car on weekends. I participated in multiple clubs, and local volunteer activities, and practiced ballroom dance which I never thought of doing if I were in Japan. Of course, I had loads of assignments but fortunately, I had time to tackle them because I lived in the dorm on campus. I could balance study and play. Thanks to this, I could acquire a sense of local people and how they view Japan.

#### What are the merits of studying abroad from GIS?

First, you can have a full 1 semester to take classes with local students there, which is something different from the Study Abroad program in other departments of Hosei. Another point is that OAS can combine regular study abroad at Hosei with OAS study abroad if you can meet the requirements of your study abroad destination (language, GPA, etc.) (I used the regular one to study abroad in Taiwan). It is also beneficial to use GIS's original "OAS scholarships" and ask for help from the GIS office. It was totally unexpected merit to have a family-like relationship with other GIS students who also studied abroad at the same university as mine.

#### **Other Studying Abroad Programs**



The regular Hosei study abroad program: The program which has a process of screening within Hosei university. It is very competitive but the selected applicants have 1 semester or 2 semester to study abroad and the tuition fee in the host school is exempted. Approved Study Abroad Program: The program in which applicants receive the entrance approval from the school of their first choice and need to also receive the approval from Hosei.



#### **Reasons for using OAS**

The reason I decided to use OAS was because the timing of my decision to study abroad was late. Applications for the regular study abroad programs close in the fall of the previous year, and the selection process begins from there. I was interested in studying abroad at the time, but after much hesitation, I decided not to apply. My desire to go study abroad grew, but I thought I had to give up the idea of studying abroad because the application for the regular study abroad program had already closed in the winter. OAS accepted my application for study abroad even in winter because of the late deadline. It was perfect for an indecisive person like me.

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#### What you want to do in your destination

My study abroad destination, San Jose State University, is located in Silicon Valley. I would like to experience firsthand why Silicon Valley is called "the center of entrepreneurship and innovation" through my study abroad. I would also like to contribute to Japan's economic recovery by spreading the culture of entrepreneurship that I learned there. In fact, I would like to spend less money because of the sharp depreciation of the yen and I just want to enjoy my days making friends in the area.
