Five Areas

"Arts and Literature" (A & L) introduces students to the study, analysis and appreciation of film, photography, art, music, and literature.

"Linguistics and Language Acquisition" (L & LA) examines how language is structured and functions, the teaching of English as a foreign language, and language variation and change. "Culture and Society" (C & S) cultivates critical perspectives to understand the complexities of global society and the minds that inhabit it.

"International Relations and Governance" (IR & G) aims to develop students' understanding of the dynamics of international society, including interactions among states and non-state actors, and its regulatory mechanisms.

(B & E) introduces students to various macro- and micro-level aspects of business, and how businesses and governments can achieve competitive advantage and sustainable growth.
